Amoranto's most persistent and obsessive dream ever since he became the Mayor of Quezon City in 1954, whereby he wished devoutly to build a monumental edifice that would house the City offices and which would be worthy of being called the City Hall of the then Capital of the Republic of the Philippines;

WHEREAS, Mayor Amoranto himself planned the fiscal requirements of the construction of the Quezon City Hall as he wants to build it through the City's own endevor without any assistance from anybody anywhere;

WHEREAS, the vision of Mayor Amoranto was realized and the New Quezon City Hall was formally inaugurated in its entirety on January 1972,

WHEREAS, the Quezon City Hall now stands, not only as an eloquent monument of the man himself, but to the vitality and capability of the Quezon City government and its leaders;

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
