ORDINANCE NO. SP-____, S-2011

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR SUPPORT MECHANISMS IN THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM IN QUEZON CITY, APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREOF AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, Section 16 of Republic Act No. 7160, otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991, states that every local government unit shall exercise the powers expressly granted, those necessarily implied therefrom, as well as powers necessary, appropriate, or incidental for its efficient and effective governance, and those which are essential to the promotion of the general welfare;

WHEREAS, Republic Act No. 10533 or the Enhanced Basic Education Act of 2013 covers six years of primary education, four years of Junior High School, and two years of Senior High School. The program seeks to develop productive and responsible citizens equipped with the essential competencies, skills and values for both life-long learning and employment;



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WHEREAS, the Senior High School Program is an integral part of the Enhanced Basic Education. Senior High School (SHS) covers the last two years of the K to 12 program; Grades 11 and 12. In SHS, students choose from one of these Tracks; Academic, Technical-Vocation, Sports and Arts and Design;

WHEREAS, this Ordinance aims to provide support mechanisms in the implementation of the Senior High School Program to help achieve the goals of K to 12.

NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF QUEZON CITY IN REGULAR SESSION ASSEMBLED:

SECTION 1. DECLARATION OF POLICY – The Quezon City government hereby reiterates the policy of the State "that every graduate of basic education shall be an empowered individual who has learned, through a program that is rooted on sound educational principles and geared towards excellence, the foundations for learning throughout life, the competence to engage in work and be productive, the ability to coexist in the fruitful harmony with local and global communities, the capability to engage in autonomous, creative and critical thinking, and the capacity and willingness to transform others and one's self," pursuant to Section 2 of R.A. No. 10533 also known as the "Enhanced Basic Education Act of 2013."

SECTION 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF AN EDUCATIONAL FUND ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR DESERVING PUBLIC SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS.

> The office of the Scholarship and Youth Development Program (SYDP) is hereby mandated to provide educational fund assistance to qualified Quezon City public school Grade 10 completers who intend to enroll in SYDP-partner schools that are permitted to offer the Senior High School program; Private High Schools, Colleges, and Universities, Local Universities and Colleges State Universities and Colleges Vocational Technical | and and(SUCs)Schools; 👍



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- (b) Qualified Senior High School scholars are as follows:
 - top three (3) Grade 10 completers from each Quezon City public secondary school; and
 - ii. a combined total of Fifty (50) Grade 10 completers from Quezon City public secondary schools that have received national or international recognition in non-academic endevours duly recognized by the Department of Education and/or the Quezon City local government;
 - iii. bonafide resident of Quezon City; and
 - iv. posesses good moral character.
- The fund assistance shall be made available (c) per academic year until the completion of the senior high school program within the prescribed two-year period.
- Per senior high school academic year, (d)subject to renewal, the following fund assistance shall be provided:
 - Four Thousand Pesos (Php4,000)- to be deducted from the scholar's tuition, miscellaneous and other school fees. This amount shall be remitted directly to the Senior High School provider where the student will enroll.
 - ii. One Thousand Five Hundred Pesos (Php1,500) - to serve as the scholar's allowance.
- SYDP is mandated The(e)to establi**s**h partnerships with Non-DepEd senior high school providers for students to be able to exercise greater choices in deciding the Senior High School program that is most relevant to their needs and career goals. 🔞







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- iv. designated point persons in-charge of coordination; and
- v. monitoring and evaluation activities.
- (d) Cognizant of the need for special protection of the child, the Quezon City Government and DCS-QC shall ensure that all venues for learning are safe and conducive for education and training.
- (e) Other conditions, circumstances and implementing guidelines that are not specifically provided hereof shall be formulated and promulgated by the City Personnel Office and the DCS-QC.

SECTION 4. PROVISION OF LAND FOR SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL BUILDINGS – As part of a continuing effort to improve the student-classroom ratio as well as to address congestion in public schools in the City, the Quezon City Government through its City Task Force on Land Acquisition and the City Task Force on Properties Forfeited in favor of the city government are hereby tasked to look for available properties at sites appropriate for schools.

SECTION 5. SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER'S TRAINING ASSISTANCE - There is hereby created a Senior High School Teacher's Training Assistance program based on the following guidelines:

- i. There shall be an annual allocation of at least Five Hundred Thousand Pesos (Php500,000.00) to be appropriated from the General Fund to finance the requirements of this program.
- ii. Specific guidelines for the implementation of this program shall be formulated by the Local School Board and to be promulgate through a Resolution.





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SECTION 6. TRANSFER OF UNNECESSARY MOVABLE PROPERTY FROM QUEZON CITY LOCAL GOVERNMENT OFFICES TO PUBLIC SENIOR HIGH SCHOOLS – The Local School Board (LSB) is mandated to facilitate the transfer of unnecessary movable property from Quezon City Local Government offices to public senior high schools. A request shall be submitted by the principals to the LSB on equipment needed by their respective schools to implement the SHS program. Thereafter, the LSB shall coordinate with the City General Services Department (CGSD) which, upon confirmation of the availability of the requested equipment, shall transfer the aforementioned to the requesting public senior high school, subject to pertinent government auditing rules and regulations.

In accordance with this Ordinance, the following terms shall mean:

Movable property – property that can be moved from one place to another. This includes, but is not limited to, motor vehicles, information technology (IT) equipment, furniture and fixtures, machineries, and communication equipment.

Unnecessary movable property – movable property that is not essential to the needs or operations of the particular office that has possession of it. The term shall include items that:

- are obsolete due to changed procedures, functions or usage patterns;
- are no longer needed;
- have exceeded their economic life;
- 4. have become unserviceable for any cause; and
- require repair or maintenance in excess of fifty percent (50%) of its current market value,

Items that no longer comply with occupational health and safety standards are to be excluded. \checkmark





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Unnecessary movable property that were turned over/returned to the CGSD are either reissued to the other departments/offices or are included in the list of properties for disposal through auction sale. For items included in the auction sale, the same cannot be pulled out or transferred to other units.

SECTION 7. SUNSET REVIEW – After the K12 transition period of School Year (SY) 2021-2022 or as the need arises, a Joint Executive-Legislative Oversight Committee shall conduct a sunset review. For purposes of this Ordinance, the term "sunset review" shall mean a systematic evaluation by the Committee of the accomplishments and impact of this Ordinance, as well as the performance and effectiveness of the institutional, organization and enabling mechanisms created hereof, for purposes of determining remedial legislations. The Committee on Education and the Local School Board with representatives from schools offering senior high school courses shall form the Joint Oversight Committee.

SECTION 8. IMPLEMENTING RULES AND REGULATIONS – The Scholarship and Youth Development Program, Local School Board, City Personnel Office, Division of City Schools – Quezon City (DCS-QC) and City General Services Department shall promulgate the necessary rules and regulations for the immediate and effective implementation of this Ordinance within a period of sixty (60) days after its effectivity.

SECTION 9. REPEALING CLAUSE - All Ordinances, Resolutions, Local Executive Orders, Rules and Regulations or any part thereof inconsistent herewith are deemed repealed, modified or amended accordingly.

SECTION 10. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE – In case any provision of this Ordinance is declared unconstitutional or invalid, the other provisions hereof which are not affected thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

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SECTION 11. EFFECTIVITY CLAUSE - This Ordinance shall take effect on the date of approval and shall remain in force until they are amended or repealed. Duly approved copies hereof shall be furnished to all concerned offices for proper implemention.
